After Fram, I spent a short time as a volunteer teacher in Malawi. This experience, together with other work with young people such as working as an EFL Teacher and with young offenders, led to my decision to study the theory of education. Oxford did not disappoint, with its renowned architecture and rich historical presence and with the collegial system offering up superb dinners and fairy-tale balls. The most important outcome of my experience was not just my

This programme also gave me the opportunity to extend my Undergraduate dissertation and I was able to undertake fieldwork in order to complete a qualitative piece of research on how UK schools support Somali pupils, in terms of achievement and aspiration. Oxford gave me the opportunity to interact both academically and socially with a wide range of professors and students, both from my own field of study and from other subject departments, which contributed to my own personal development.
