Only seven items were available when the auction first went live on March 31 but they managed to raise in excess of £2,000.

It attracted 77 bids and eventually sold for £1.020.

More than 70 pieces of clothing, which Ed wore in live shows as well as on shoots and videos, were later added on April 3. Bidding

closed at 8pm on Sunday.

Around half of the items available went to fans outside of the UK, including Belgium and the United States.

## Community microchipping day a success

Dog owners prepared themselves for a change in the law at an event held at a Suffolk library earlier this month.

From April 2016, all dogs will have to be microchipped and around the country sessions are being run to help owners have their pets marked and registered.

One such event in Ipswich saw Suffolk police's South East Ipswich Safer Neighbourhood Team join forces with the Gainsborough Community Library and the Dogs Trust.

More than 80 dogs of all shapes and sizes were given a free microchip at the library by the trust at the session.

The Dogs Trust has set aside £6million to provide free microchipping to owners of all unchipped pets so they can comply with the law when it comes into force.

Normally, having a dog microchipped costs £20 to £30.

It is thought having compulsory microchipping of dogs will save the taxpayer between £20m and £22m.

The microchip is implanted under the skin of the dog between the shoulder blades.

Once implanted the microchip is unlikely to fail and so provides lifelong permanent identification.

The chips are read by scanners held by vets, local authorities and animal welfare groups.

# Marathon runner appointed as charity fundraising ambassador

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A Suffolk marathon runner who almost died in a car crash just weeks after her father was diagnosed with cancer has been made an "inspirational ambassador" for a charity.

Kim Frost, 36, from Framlingham, is one of 26 fundraising champions chosen by Cancer Research UK to encourage others to undertake running challenges in support of the charity, which was unveiled today as an official partner of the Virgin Money London Marathon in 2015.

am calling on people across Suffolk to take on just one running challenge over the next 12 months – big or small – on behalf of Cancer Research UK," she said.

Miss Frost's tragic, yet inspirational story, which led to her appointment, began with a devastating road accident in June 2007 that left her with terrible leg injuries and took the life of her mother, Jean.

Coming just a month after Miss Frost's father Derrick had been diagnosed with cancer, it made it all the more difficult to cope with her mother's death. "It was a terrible time," she said. "I was grieving for my mum and trying to recover in hospital while at the same time my dad was fighting his own battle with oesophageal cancer."

The loss was also incredibly hard on Mr Frost whose condition deteriorated after the accident until his death 18 months later.

Miss Frost, who works as a chef at Brandeston Hall Prep School, had been a keen member of Framlingham was determined to regain her fitness.

Despite being left with metal plates in her legs, wondering whether she would ever walk again, her recuperation was boosted by a charity football match in aid of Cancer Research UK between Framlingham Town and Ipswich Town in September 2007.

She joined Framlingham Flyers and enrolled in this year's London Marathon, achieving a lifelong ambition on Sunday when she completed the event in 5h 43m, raising more than £4,000 for Cancer Research UK.

The charity is calling for people to sign up for the London Marathon or local fun runs.
