## **MAJOR RICHARD DEAN RUSSELL MC (1897-1901)**

He was born on 10 March 1884.

During WW1 he served in the Honourable Artillery Company (HAC) and Royal Field Artillery. He was awarded the Military Cross (no further details). The HAC website contains the following information .\_

- He was admitted to HAC on 11 April 1904 at the age of 20
- Occupation jute-shipper and merchant (pre- 1914)
- B Bty throughout: Dvr, Bdr 13 July 1908, Cpl 21 June 1909, Sgt 11 October 1909, BSM 1 November 1911.
- Transferred to Reserve Bty Ammunition Column 1 November 1913: BSM; transferred to Reserve Coy 20 April 1914.



- Appointed Acting Major commanding RFA 33 Div. II/16V Bde 17 June 1918-11 June 1919 (when suffered a breakdown of an old wound)
- Milatery Cross awarded 6 November 1918.
- Remained in France after the Armistice; demobilised 3 December 1919.
- HAC: Reserve of Officers. Gazetted Capt. & Adjt RA (TA) 1939.
- Served in WWII with the Home Guard, XIX Platoon: Pte until 1944. HAC: Father of the Regiment 1973, succeeding Russell Rumney (q.v.). Presentations to the Company: A&HAC medals (presented by his daughter, Mrs Stevenson Clarke, in 1984). Company also holds Russell's officer's sword.
- Died 2 September 1984 completed eighty years' membership.
- HAC Archives holds photograph of Russell on horseback in 1915 (see below) and one of 1980, plus his
  personal photograph albums, which contain many images of him. Photographs published in War
  Illustrated 6 March 1915 and HACJ no. 427, pp. 68 and 70.

On his  $100^{th}$  birthday he became the longest paid up member of the Honourable Artillery Company for 400 years. He received a personal message from the Queen – she is Colonel in Chief of the Regiment. The following picture was taken on his  $100^{th}$  birthday, when although his sight and hearing were poor, he not only remembered all the surnames of the boys the College when he was there, but their forenames as well. He was also able to remember the names of comrades in WW1.

He died in his 101st year on 2 September 1984 and was Father of the Royal Artillery Company.

There is a window in his local church (St.Andrew's, Limpsfield Chart, Surrey) in memory of him – see next page.
